Minutes... Meeting February 25, 2020

At the request of our AAUW president Jolene, four members presented the program on Women of the Suffrage Movement in Missouri.

Lisa Cox was our first speaker; her story was on **Anna Clapp**. Anna was the only elected president of the Ladies' Union Aid Society (LUAS) of St. Louis, until the group disbanded in 1869. She gave help to wounded soldiers and their families. She encouraged women to get outside their home in an effort to help soldiers during the war. Anna often referred to her "union loyalty".



Karen Johnson was our second speaker; her story was on **Virginia Minor**. In 1866 Virginia launched the woman suffrage movement in Missouri. In 1867, she took an active role in founding the Women Suffrage Association of Missouri, which was the first organization to take aim of enfranchising women. During the woman suffrage convention held in St. Louis in 1869, Virginia made a speech urging women to no longer submit to their inferior condition. Her husband Francis drafted a set of resolutions which asserted the right of woman suffrage under the U.S. Constitution, based on the wording of the 14th Amendment. In October 1872, Virginia register to vote for an

upcoming election, but was refused by St. Louis sixth district registrar, Reese Happersett. Happersett refused to let Virginia register because she was a female. This issue sued in a civil action case against Happersett, (by her husband, because married women could not sue in Missouri courts until after the passage of the Married Women's Act of 1889). Virginia appeared before the U.S. Senate committee on women suffrage in 1889, to once more state her case. She also served as vice president of the Interstate Woman Suffrage Convention, held in Kansas City in 1892.

Sue Shineman was our third speaker; her story was on **Phoebe Jane (Routt) Ess**. Born in 1850, died at the age of 84. Phoebe was described as passionate and energized force in Kansas City public life. She began teaching upper grade

students at the first public school, Washington School; located at Independence
Avenue and Cherry Street. Phoebe was fondly remembered as the "dean of
Missouri-club women." She also was a forerunner to what we know has
Parent-Teacher Associations (PTAs). Phoebe also was the first woman in
city history to run for election for a public office. She is widely remembered
for her work on behalf of women's suffrage. She was an advocate for passage
of the 19th Amendment. She was also one of the founders of the Susan B. Anthony
Civic Club and served as the only president for 23 years. Jackson County was the
first county to adopt women's suffrage. Phoebe didn't wait at home; she made a difference.

Added to our program was our own Patty Chadwick, who spoke about her grandmother Ida Lee Williams. Ida came from a farming family, starting in a cotton field. Patty told of her grandmother's experience of casting her first vote following the ratification of the 19th amendment. With fabric she ordered from Sears & Roebuck, Ida made a new suit to wear as she cast her first vote in the county seat of Nevada, MO.

President's Report – Jolene Cerveny.

- 1. **Fundraising Letters:** Letters asking for a onetime donation to our branch was approved as an alternative fundraiser. 60 letters were mailed last week to past members, past women of achievement, and others. Current membership will also be receiving this letter. The cost per mailed letter was \$.68, letters distributed at this meeting is \$.11.
- 2. **Centennial of Women's Right to Vote: Their Fight, Our Right.** Sue Shineman and Jolene delivered the donation items of a book and DVD to William Chrisman High School. Sue Raymond and Jolene will deliver the donation to Van Horn on Wednesday, February 26.
- 3. **Book Sale & Bookmarks:** Bookmarks commemorating the Centennial of Women's Vote are available and will be distributed to book buyers until the supply is gone. Cost per marker is about \$.03.
- 4. **Parades:** Sue Shineman is our "parade master". My sincerest thanks to her for doing the groundwork for this activity.
- 5. **Community Activities:** "The Golden Lane: How Missouri Women Gained the Vote and Changed History" program at the Central Library on Sunday, March 15th, 2 p.m. The story of the 1916 Democratic Convention in St. Louis and how women there advanced the achievement of women's suffrage.
- 6. **AAUW Art Contest:** We hear a lot about the gender gap—in salary, leadership roles and in the fields of math and science. But one of the most long-standing discrepancies is in the art world. For centuries, women artists were not encouraged or even recognized. Times have changed but inequality persists. Only 30% of artists represented in commercial galleries are women and they are paid \$20K less per year than men artists. That is what motivated the annual AAUW art contest, the goal is to give women artists the attention they deserve. You can view the six winning entries online. Note cards with the featuring the winning entries will be mailed in the spring. Again, thanks to Mary Morgan and Lisa Cox for working together to submit an entry featuring the STEM project at Proctor Elementary.

Sue Shineman- we have been approved to march in the Brookside parade. It will be held on March 14th, starts at 2 p.m. She will send additional information to members after she attends a planning meeting. As it is a St. Patrick's Day kick-off parade, the wearing of green is one requirement.

Jane Campbell- Book Club for March has changed to March 11th at her home, gather @ 9 a.m., book club starts @ 9:30 a.m.

Patt Braley- announced Vice-President, Membership will be Sue Raymond and Debbie White. Financial Officer will be Lois Domsch, and Corresponding Secretary will be Nancy Comtois.

Sue Raymond- Membership, we have a new member Sharon Royer. She attended UMKC and Mizzou. Please make her feel welcome.

Kathy Vest- Student Awards, she has talked to the Independence foundation about the criteria for the scholarships. The students must pass the first stage of rules of accomplishments. We have received applications from twenty-nine students at Truman, nine students from Van Horn, and nine students from William Chrisman. We will pick three girls from each school.

Re-Entry- MCC Blue River we have not been given much response. They are a young group, with not many as re-entry students. They need to carry a 3.0 grade point average at semester, they don't have accumulate grade **point** average. Not much communication from MCC Longview College. Re-Entry Brunch is on April 18th.
