


Vintage Books

Voter Registration and Support the Voter = This info is from AAUW National.

U.S. Census data from 2020 shows that as many as 1 in 4 eligible Americans are not registered to vote. We must do more than just register voters—we must ensure everyone is able to access this basic right.

Several key Congressional committees have heard testimony that barriers to voter participation remain for people of color and language-minority voters, and the wave of anti-voter bills continues in state legislatures. Yet we know that these hurdles do not reflect the will of the people.

The freedom to vote is not a political issue—it is a Constitutional right. Americans of all races, backgrounds, genders, and zip codes have the same right to vote. The Freedom to Vote Act will restore federal protections gutted by the Shelby County v. Holder Supreme Court case and under attack from the wave of anti-voter bills sweeping the nation, while modernizing the ways in which voters access a secure and convenient process.

As your committee co-chairs, we will follow the program **STEMEd for Girls** and explore the possibility of getting some local girls enrolled in the next program.

STEMEd For Girls: An Experiment with Promising Results

In the summer of 2021, more than 600 teen girls from across the U.S and the U.K. took part in AAUW's inaugural <u>STEMEd for Girls</u> virtual workshop series, which was designed exclusively for girls in grades 9 through 12 and their parents and guardians. The program, which was made possible through the generous support of <u>Arconic Foundation</u>, was designed to pave the way for girls' STEM success in college and beyond. We especially encouraged girls of color to participate.

Why It Matters

<u>Research shows that girls are systematically tracked away</u> from science and math throughout their education—which limits their training and options as adults. Black and Latina girls are even more likely to be dissuaded from STEM due to racism and reduced access to critical resources, opportunities and role models.

When it comes to setting girls up for STEM success, ensuring they have support from their caregivers is an important piece of the puzzle. That's why AAUW engaged this group from the outset, focusing two of the six sessions on giving hands-on guidance to parents and guardians.

AAUW September 28, 2021 = Meeting Minutes ~ Gail Metcalf-Schartel

Program

Renee Freers called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. via Zoom. She asked Sue Shineman to introduce the evening's special guest speakers.

Sue introduced Donna Hoch, Past President of the League of Women's Voters of Kansas City who has 48 years of experience in in social work, and Evelyn Maddox, Past President of the League of Women's Voters of Missouri who has Human Resource experience in Kansas and with for profit organizations.

Their presentation centered on voter suppression in Missouri.

Business Meeting

Renee noted that the Public Policy Priorities for AAUW aligned with the topic of the speakers. Among AAUW's public policy goals is 'Vigorous enforcement of and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including affirmative action and expanding voting rights'.

Renee introduced her friend Dr. Maria Fleming, a school administrator who had experience in the Independence, Raymore-Peculiar and Fort Osage districts who currently works with Franklin Covey training leaders.

Lois Domsch presented the budget for the coming year. At present the branch has \$13,415.47 in the checking and savings accounts. She noted that the full budget would be included in the yearbook. A motion (Lois Domsch/Kathy Vest) to approve the budget as submitted was approved unanimously.

Renee noted that there was an opening on the Board for someone to chair the fund-raising committee. She asked that anyone interested in serving contact her.

Kelley Reetzke reported that there are several bills/legislation that correspond to our mission statement that she had been watching. The process of most of these items has stalled or totally shelved.

Patt Braley presented information on the work branch finance committee. Rather than summarize her remarks, below is the report of the committee:

Barbara Leabo reported on College and University. She asked for help staffing the voter registration tables at Blue River Community College on October 5th from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. She said that the Branch would be on that campus to discuss sexual harassment and Community Day as well. Jolene volunteered to be at the October 5th from 10-11:30 and Karol Palmer agreed to be there from 11:30-1 p.m.

Sue Shineman said that the October meeting would cover 'Membership Matters' and would include information by officers and chairs as to how much participation in activities relates to their roles. The Branch action plan will also be discussed.

Renee noted that a decision on when to meet in person had not been settled. She said that in conference with others, it was decided that the September, October, and November meetings would be held via Zoom. After discussing the November meeting, a vote was taken to determine whether it would be held in person or via Zoom. The vote was too close to call so that will be discussed at the October meeting. The hope is to have the December meeting as scheduled at V's but COVID will play into the final decision.

The question of distribution of yearbooks was raised. Patty said she considered delivering them, perhaps giving others a few to deliver.

Sue Raymond asked that she be sent any potential guests' information so that she can include an official invitation to a meeting. She encouraged all to ask friends to consider attending and joining AAUW.

Lisa Cox said that the newsletter deadline is October 7th and that she plans to distribute it by October 15th.

Renee thanked everyone for their attendance and the meeting ended at 8:50 p.m.
