

AAUW Independence Branch February 25, 2025 Meeting Minutes

Karol Palmer called the meeting to order at seven o'clock and welcomed all. She asked Sue Raymond to introduce the evening's speakers. Sue introduced Teresa Dorsch and Brandon Schnur from the Englewood Arts Center.

Ms. Dorsch outlined the goal of Englewood Ars which is to make the visual and performing arts accessible and to create affordable housing for educators, artists, and the existing community. In 2019 students from the Metropolitan Community Colleges in the Construction and Building Sciences program were utilized to help transform the former Comprehensive Mental Health building into the Englewood Arts Center. The goal was to develop a regional arts center to engage the community. The group worked to attain special zoning for the Englewood Area. A \$4M capital campaign is underway with \$3.6M raised.

The building includes exhibition space, a glass blowing studio, and a performance center on the first floor. The second floor has a ceramics studio and classrooms. The third floor includes painting and fiber studios, artist's studios and exhibition space. On the lower floor there is a woodshop and metal fabrication area. In addition, there is an exterior gathering space and a shop featuring goods made by the various artists in residence. Spaces within the Englewood Arts Center have areas available to rent for group gatherings. Classes and workshops are also offered in all mediums.

Various groups, including Special Olympics and Polynesian Cultural Festival have been hosted in the facility. During the summer there are camps for kids with 50% of those attending from lower income families with scholarship assistance. Participants receive two meals each day and take home meals. In 2024, 150 students participated in the summer camps.

Artists in Residence have studio space in exchange for working 10 hours a week with classes and producing items to sell in the on-site shop. The Artists in Residence have housing in the immediate area.

Having established the Englewood Arts District, there are plans to help grow the neighborhood by working to build new homes on vacant lots, encouraging people to rehab existing homes and building auxiliary housing in backyards.

After answering many questions, the speakers were thanked for their presentation.

At 8:00 p.m., Karol called the business meeting to order.

PROGRAMS: At the Board Meeting on June 10, 2025 the program coordinators and all members are asked to attend and discuss program ideas. In addition to Branch meetings, the group hopes to implement the plan to have joint meetings/programs with other branches of the KC IBC.

COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY: Gail reminded members that the Branch would be at Blue River Community College on March 27 from 11:30-1:00 for Pay Equity Day and again on April 23, 2025 for Sexual Assault Awareness (Denim) Day.

WOMAN OF ACHIEVEMENT: Karol reminded the group that nominations for Woman of Achievement were due by March 31.

CITY OF INDEPENDENCE DAY OF THE CHILD: The Day of the Child event has been rescheduled for September 6, 2025 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. She, Lisa Cox, Lois Domsch, Karen Johnson, and Judy Tyson have been brainstorming ideas for a STEM activity for the day.
